Highlights of June 13, 2023 Congregation Council meeting:

- → An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) has been ordered for the church. Training will be scheduled in the near future for all church goers to learn how to use this potentially lifesaving equipment.
- → For the month of May 2023, offerings exceeded expenses by \$4,782. For the year to date, offerings have exceeded expenses by \$2,806.
- Two signs for our parking lot have been purchased and received. These will be used when we have evening services or events so our parking spaces will be available for people attending the church. These are sandwich style signs that will be placed at the two entrances informing people that the lot at that time is for Church Parking Only.
- → The property insurance for the church is increasing by \$2,056 per year. This is due to the rising costs of construction which in turn raises the cost of replacing or repairing property should damage occur. The cost increase is effective July 1, 2023.
- → A Homebound Training Group Meeting has been rescheduled for Sunday June 23 (from May 21) at 9:00 am in the Chapel. This is an information meeting for visiting and taking communion to our homebound members.
- A new members class has been scheduled for Sunday, June 18 at 9:00 am in the Chapel. This will be open to anyone wishing to attend. Anyone wishing to join as a Member or Associate Member will be received on Sunday, June 25. Associate Members are persons holding membership in other Christian congregations who wish to retain such membership but desire to participate in the life and mission of Emmanuel. They would have all the rights and privileges and duties of membership except for voting rights or other rights ascribed to voting members.
- → Emmanuel is being advertised once again in the Lincoln Times- News along with other churches in the community.
- → A report for the Synod Assembly held June 2-3 will be in the Newsletter soon. Our delegates were Bob Lake and Dara Jarrett.





Throughout the past several years, LivingLutheran.org has been the magazine's online platform, and we are excited about the ways in which we can enhance how you are able to experience the stories and lives of Lutherans throughout the ELCA as we transition to a fully online approach. You will start to see us employing these ways throughout the year, with videos, audio stories and more. This transition will also include a more robust social media presence and more opportunities for user-generated content with the potential for greater engagement from you, our most loyal readers.

The ELCA and its predecessor church bodies have been printing periodicals since 1831, when The Lutheran Observer began. Spreading the gospel and sharing the stories of our church have always been at the foundation of who we are as Christians and Lutherans. As many of you probably know, the cost of printing a magazine - including paper, ink and postage prices - has steadily increased, especially during the pandemic, making it difficult to financially support a print edition. Being good stewards of the generous support given to the church is of the upmost importance to our team. While we will no longer print a magazine each month, the sharing and spreading of the good news continues every day.

By focusing on creating more online content and new channels for distribution we will have more flexibly and options for how we tell the stories of this church. Storytelling will still be a the core of this work. We understand there are a lot of questions regarding your subscription, how the ELCA will reach readers who don't rely on the internet for information and how we will assist those who use Living Lutheran for church resources and group discussions. We are still working out answers to those questions and will provide them as soon as possible.

What started as a simple soup kitchen 45 years ago by area churches has become one of Second Harvest's most productive agency partners. Last year, Christian Ministry of Lincoln County distributed more than 631,000 pounds of food.

"We have hard-working people in retail, in restaurants and fast food and all kinds of jobs who are not making ends meet," explained Mitzi Williams, Executive Director. "They need to come here and get food to stretch their dollars. Thankfully, Second Harvest helps us to do that. Between Second Harvest and our member churches, that's how we have the amount of food we have."

Watching people go to the food pantry for the first time, Mitzi said, "They're all afraid. You can see them coming in with their heads down. I think their self-worth goes down. They're exhausted from working every hour they can to get every dollar, yet they still cannot make it.

They're worried about that bill, worried about their child getting everything that they need. And it shouldn't be that way."

Then something beautiful happens when "The people here treat everyone with respect," Mitzi explains. "You see them stand up a little straighter and smile and say, "Okay, I'm going to make it, I'm going to make it through."

"If we did not have access to Second Harvest, our food distribution would go down at least a quarter of the amount that we give out," Mitzi admits. "They have a well-oiled machine down there, and it really helps everyone around.

"Our greatest joy at Christin Ministry is seeing people happy with what they get here, and them recognizing that it took the community to make it happen," - donors, churches, volunteers, and Second Harvest.

Like one man said, "Having this food here, having the vegetables and the meat and the things that you really need, it's a blessing to me in my life." We hope you know that you are making a huge difference every day!"
