Seeing Our Neighbors Anew

In April 2022, congregations in a Lutheran Services Carolinas' Circle of Welcome worked together to relocate a family from Afghanistan to Hickory, NC. Two months into the marathon of resettlement, after Eidal-Fitr celebrations for the end of Ramadan and the birth of a new baby, they gathered in a city park picnic shelter to celebrate World Refugee Day. This event drew families from Syria, Pakistan, India, Catawba County—and of course Afghanistan—and it was a kick-off for a three-night Vacation Bible School program for Circle congregations. The ecumenical, intergenerational VBS drew on a Lutheran World Relief curriculum, "Seeing Our Neighbors" that was designed for congregations engaged in efforts to support Ukrainian refugees. Leaders tweaked the resource to deepen our conversations about God's call to welcome Afghan evacuees to North Carolina.

Gathering at the partner church, Northminster Presbyterian, participants joined in a meal before breaking into program groups for adults and children. The adults engaged in *Visio Divina*, an exercise in "divine seeing" that utilized images of the evacuation and resettlement in conjunction with a study of Matthew 25: 31-49. Each evening invited those gathered to think about ways to welcome the stranger, help the sick, or feed the hungry—essential care for neighbors near and far.

Children heard stories from Jewish, Muslim, and Christian perspectives that elaborated on being good neighbors. And, like any good VBS program, arts, games, and plenty of play kept the children engaged. Pastor Jill Isola of the host church commented that one of her favorite moments was hearing children swinging and shouting "It's a mitz-vah!" from a children's book they read about doing good deeds. Six- and eight-year-old Madeline and Ella Tomberlin, members of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Hickory, said that their favorite part of the week was playing games about being neighbors. Their mother, Jessica, really enjoyed getting to know some of the other members from the Circle of Welcome including the Afghan children. She said that the opportunity "pushed me to get out of my comfort zone and interact with people beyond St. Andrew's. The focus of the VBS on welcoming the stranger definitely spoke to me."

Share: Share your highs and lows

Read: Luke 11:1-13

Talk: Slowly reflect on the reading. Did anything grab your attention as you read the passage? We spend our entire lives accumulating, and to what end? Truth be told, we can't take our accumulations with us when we go. It is passed down from generation to generation, or it is thrown away. And the cycle is lived out over, and over, and over again. When my parents died we were left a whole household of stuff. We are still going through boxes, 10 years later. Our kids have told us that they

don't want our stuff, so please don't leave it for them to deal with.

Why do we cling so tightly to stuff? Does it really bring us joy? Meaning? Purpose? I am a pack rat. I like stuff, but the older I get the more I realize the words of Ecclesiastes 1:2, "Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity." My stuff does not enrich my relationship with God, and much of it has become an encumbrance. The more we have the more we need to protect it. Our stuff begins to own us, rather than the other way around.

What things do you need to let go of in your life? What things do you need to be free from? What will enhance the relationship that God has established with you in baptism? What do you really treasure in this world?

Pray: Holy God, you are our true treasure. Help us cast aside the things that would rise above you. Grant us wisdom and discernment that we might not be taken by false gods. Focus our hearts on the true treasure. Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen
